During the hearing, the witnesses testified about whether they were paid to favor the defense and whether they fully complied with providing evidence about communications with the defense. (The overall question was whether the defense has violated reciprocal discovery of evidence, a requirement enabling both sides to have equal access to evidence being presented.) Dr. Daniel Wolfe testified that he provided all the communications he had access to and wanted to “help the jury,” not advocate for the defense.

A report on additional testing by ARCCA for the defense is expected by May 7, and while permitting the witnesses to testify, Cannone said she planned to allow a “robust cross-examination” by Brennan. She also reminded defense counsel of their duty to comply with “all rules of the court and rules of professional conduct,” while urging them to dispense with the “nonsense” moving forward.

Earlier in the day on Monday, expert testimony focused on the use of technology as Ian Whiffin, digital forensics examiner with Cellebrite, described his analysis of data downloaded from the phones of McCabe and O’Keefe as part of a lengthy direct examination by Brennan.

Regarding McCabe’s phone, Whiffin explained that digital time stamps can be misleading as they apply to the time that a browser tab was opened, not to when a search was

inputted. Whiffin said this happened in the case of the internet search for “[How] long to die in cold” conducted on McCabe’s phone on January 29, 2022. While the defense points to records indicating that the search was made at 2:27 a.m. — several hours before an unresponsive O’Keefe was found in the snow outside the home of McCabe’s sister — McCabe claims that she made the search at Read’s request after they had located O’Keefe.

Whiffin testified that the time stamp of 2:27 a.m. was retained from the time the tab was first opened for a search regarding a youth basketball program and then remained unchanged, not only for several successive searches conducted shortly afterward but also searches begun four hours later for variations on “[how] long to die in cold.”

Moving on to O’Keefe’s phone, Whiffin focused on data pertaining to location, health, and battery temperature, starting at 12:19 a.m. when Read’s Lexus traveled from Washington Street until about 6 a.m. Referring to the flag pole at the side of the Alberts’ property on Fairview Road near where the phone indicated Read’s car stopped, he said, “Based on the totality of information, my opinion is that the phone never moved from the flag pole.”

Whiffin drew this conclusion from the GPS location, Apple Health data indicating 36 steps taken, altitude change data, which coincided only with the time the car was traveling, and battery temperature, which

steadily decreased after 12:37 a.m. until approximately 6 a.m. He said information from “Pocket State,” indicating that the camera is blocked, supported the argument that O’Keefe remained outside with the phone.

Cross-examination by Robert Alessi for the defense briefly addressed Whiffin’s timeline and the question of O’Keefe’s phone Face ID.

In separate news on Monday, the U.S. Supreme Court declined to hear Read’s case, ending her double jeopardy appeal on the basis that jurors in the first trial may have voted to acquit on two of the three charges against her.

Last week, which was the first in what is expected to be a lengthy retrial, emotional displays and personal relationships were at the forefront. Besides Peg O’Keefe’s grief as she testified on the witness stand about the day she lost her son John, the anger and exasperation of a prolonged text discussion between Read and O’Keefe was highlighted. Personal connections between various pairs of individuals or groups were also addressed by attorneys on both sides.

In stark contrast to the emotional content of the trial, technology also had a major role. Woven throughout the early proceedings were frequent references to Ring cameras, phone data extraction, dash cams, and video surveillance. The centrifuge system used for analyzing blood samples for alcohol content was described as well as software used to extract phone data.

On Friday, April 25 (day four of the

trial), the jury went for a site visit at 34 Fairview Road to better understand and visualize the events of January 29, 2022. On their return, Garrey Fuller, chief pathologist and lab medical director at Good Samaritan Hospital, described the testing process of Read’s blood sample, which revealed a high alcohol content at 9:03 a.m. on January 29. No other drugs were found. On cross-examination by defense team member Elizabeth Little, Fuller said the hospital testing procedure is equivalent in quality to the forensic testing method and that Read’s anemia and multiple sclerosis would not make much difference in the alcohol content.

Also taking the stand was CFD Paramedic Jason Becker, who testified about taking Read in the ambulance for a psychiatric evaluation that morning. He described her as somewhat resistant at first, but finally cooperative with going to Good Samaritan. He said he talked with her about people who survived after being in the cold.

Testimony on Thursday, April 24, was widely varied. CFD Paramedic Daniel Whitley also gave testimony about taking Read to the hospital, which was generally consistent with Becker’s. On cross-examination for the defense, Attorney David Yannetti pressured him regarding inconsistencies in words used and how close his relationship was with another witness, Kerry Roberts, who is a neighbor of Becker’s. Yannetti also suggested, on Wednesday when Whitley first testified, that there is a close relationship between firefighters

and police in Canton.

Jean DeMulis and Bridget Meehan of C.F. McCarthy’s and Waterfall Bar and Grille, respectively, testified separately to the use of video surveillance at the businesses and confirmed the authenticity of short clips.

Michael Camerano, a friend of O’Keefe’s, was sometimes emotional as he recalled the hours they spent together on the afternoon and early evening of January 28. He said that he had neither seen nor been told of any problems between O’Keefe and Read and that when Read joined them at C.F. McCarthy’s he saw only affection and happiness.

Contradicting this picture, State Trooper Nick Guarino presented a tension-filled record of text messages between Read and O’Keefe the same afternoon. It continued for hours with repeated references to an earlier fight and whether they should get together later. Guarino read the texts aloud as they were projected on a screen, noting also when numerous calls came in, mostly from Read to O’Keefe, who often did not take them.

Guarino’s testimony had begun on Wednesday, April 23, when he described his expertise and the highly technical, secure process of extracting phone data.

Earlier on April 23, emotions took center stage with the testimony of Peg O’Keefe, who did not take the witness stand in the first trial. She described how her daughter Krista died in 2013 and how John took over raising his

niece and nephew after his brother-in-law died also just a few months later. Breaking up with grief at times, Peg also testified about her encounter in the hospital with Read who asked, “Peg, is he dead? Is he dead, Peg?”

Roberts was also tearful as she recalled her friendship with O’Keefe. She described her experiences on January 29 and the day after. She was asked to verify footage from a Ring camera, a police car dash cam, and photographs and to explain the damage she saw on the rear passenger taillight of Read’s Lexus when they met up on the morning of January 29 to search for O’Keefe.

Cross-examining her, Attorney Alan Jackson questioned her closeness to McCabe and how influenced she was by McCabe. He also challenged her memory and truthfulness, specifically regarding her previous account of being present for the internet search “[How] long to die in cold” and then stating that she only heard about it later.

Besides the ongoing national notoriety, the retrial has been notable so far for the prosecution’s distinctive use of media, including clips from Read interviews with outside sources. On the opposite side, Read’s unusually active participation in her defense, including participating in “sidebars” — off the record conversations with the judge — is another departure from the norm.

As of last Friday, Judge Beverly Cannone noted that the trial was “on schedule.”

SB approves new stormwater fee to support critical infrastructure

two- or three-family home, the annual stormwater fee will be two ERUs, or \$200, divided into four quarterly charges of \$50.

Impervious surface area is defined as any material or structure on or above the ground that prevents water from infiltrating into the underlying soil. This includes, but is not limited to, driveways, parking lots, roads, sidewalks, rooftops and patios.

For all other properties, the annual fee will be calculated based on the impervious area on a developed parcel of land divided by the area of one ERU, with values of less than 0.5 ERUs rounded down and values of 0.5 or greater ERUs rounded up. For example, a property with 10,000 square feet

of impervious surface contains 2.89 ERUs. That figure would be rounded up to 3 ERUs for a total annual bill of \$300 (\$75 per quarter).

The revenues generated by the new stormwater fee will help fund the replacement and maintenance of stormwater infrastructure, which helps to protect properties and ensure that roadways are drivable. Examples of this infrastructure include clean catch basins and storm drains along with structurally safe and effectively operated dams.

Currently, the town of Canton maintains 250 miles of roadway, 56 miles of drainpipe, 2,300 catch basins, 270 stormwater outfalls, 2,250 drain manholes, 38 culverts, 15 proprietary separators, 48 oil and grit chambers,

18 drywells, 13 subsurface infiltration systems, 21 detention and retention basins, 14 rain gardens, and six dams.

However, much of the existing infrastructure is operating beyond its useful design life. The town must also keep up with new infrastructure needs as roads and properties are constructed.

“Our stormwater infrastructure is an asset to the town, and we need to proactively take care of it,” said Canton Stormwater Manager Kristine Meaney. “We need to upgrade systems that are now undersized due to new development and heavier rainstorms. Our first line of defense from flooding is Canton’s storm drainage system, making it imperative to aggressively inspect, repair, redesign, and expand our drainage network.”

Looking to the future, officials said the new fee may need to be modified in order to meet all of the town’s stormwater management costs, and any adjustments would be made through a written resolution that also requires approval by the Select Board.

In addition to funding infrastructure repairs and maintenance, officials said revenues from the new stormwater utility fee will also help the town meet the mandatory requirements imposed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for maintenance of its Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit. The permit requires the town to conduct public outreach, public participation, detection and elimination of illicit discharge, management of construction

and post-construction site runoff, and good housekeeping of municipal operations.

Meeting the requirements of the MS4 permit will ensure that the town can safely discharge stormwater from town-owned or town-operated drainage systems into the community’s brooks, ponds, rivers, and wetlands. Meaney said failing to do so would result in untreated water from rainfall or melting snow carrying pollution into the storm drainage system and ultimately making its way into local waterways.

Meaney said pollutants such as litter, vehicle fluids, pet waste, and seepage from failing septic systems are swept up by stormwater runoff. Bacteria and chemicals can then make waters unsafe for recreation, harm aquatic

life, and cause other disturbances in the ecosystem. Excess phosphorous and nitrogen from fertilizer, grass clippings, and fallen leaves that enter the storm drain system can also end up in the town’s brooks, ponds and rivers, creating a cascade of negative effects — killing fish, destroying habitats, and potentially impacting human health.

“We need to maintain and improve our stormwater system now instead of compromising our ability to care for it in the future,” said Meaney. “Clean stormwater and a maintained infrastructure system keeps our waterways free from pollution, ensures our roads are drivable, promotes public safety, preserves property values, and prevents localized and large-scale flooding.”
